FINAL SUMMER SUPPER CANCELLED

With regret we announce that the final summer supper, scheduled for Wednesday, August 17, at University of Richmond, has been cancelled.

The evening was planned to be dinner and a vesper service commemorating the 60th anniversary of the first service that led to the founding of River Road Church, Baptist. Dinner was to be shared at the Heilman Dining Hall on the UR campus, followed by a vesper service in the Jenkins Greek Theater, site of the first worship service on August 19, 1945.

Extensive construction on the UR campus made access to the dining hall and Greek Theater precarious, requiring long walks from parking areas and moving people up and down multiple levels in the dining hall.

Other events in the coming year will commemorate the church's 60th anniversary.



“THE GATE OF ETERNAL LIFE”

“Give us faith to see in death the gate of eternal life, so that in quiet confidence we may continue our course on earth... .”

This phrase appears in one of the Collects from a service of burial in *The Book of Common Prayer*. It sums up all we could hope for in a Christian funeral—that it would leave us with enough confidence to move ahead with life, bolstered by the hope that what lies beyond death is life abundant and eternal.

That’s a tall order for a 30 to 45-minute worship service. In fact, it is impossible when the circumstances of the death are particularly tragic or sad, or when those who grieve enter the valley of the shadow of death without much confidence in the gospel. It is,

however, a goal.

After a few hundred funerals, here are a few of my thoughts on the subject.

First, a Christian funeral is, or should be, a service of worship. We do not worship the person who has died, though we do honor them. We worship God, the Giver of all life, the One who gave the deceased his/her life, the Redeemer who welcomes us with mercy at life’s end, the Guarantor of the Resurrection.

Second, a Christian funeral is an opportune time to proclaim the gospel, not by grabbing lapels or manipulating emotions, but by reminding people in attendance that God is love and showed this by the giving of the Son. People who would never attend Sunday morning worship find a pew to honor a colleague, neighbor or relative. We misrepresent our faith when we do not announce the promise of eternal life.

Third, the time to plan a funeral is not after a person dies. That is when the planning most often occurs, but by necessity it is hurried, and decisions are made under emotional stress. One of the best gifts you can

leave your children, brothers or sisters, cousins, etc. is to voice your requests about your own funeral. Write down your favorite scriptures and hymns. State your preference about where the service will take place and who should officiate. List items that should be included in an obituary, including where you want memorial contributions sent. Talk with one of the clergy about this and leave a copy with your important papers. You may also want to keep a copy on file at the church.

Thomas Lynch, a funeral director and poet, once wrote that “there is nothing like the sight of a dead human body to assist the living in separating the good days from the bad ones (*Bodies in Motion and At Rest: On Metaphor and Mortality*, p. 41).” A Christian funeral should try to make the bad days a little better by remembering that life is gift from God.

JOB AND THE LIFE OF FAITH: WISDOM FOR TODAY'S WORLD

"The Book of Job cuts straight to the heart of what it means to be human. It is one of the most profound explorations of the life of faith ever written, and wrestles with some of life's most perplexing questions. Why do bad things happen to good people? Is there a correspondence between sin and suffering, obedience and blessing? Why should we serve God if there are no guarantees? The Book of Job provides lessons for people suffering a crisis of faith after such disasters as the Indian Ocean tsunami, or the London bombings, or the senseless acts of terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan. There was never a

time when the book of Job was not relevant, but it is especially relevant today. This is not because the book of Job has changed, but because we have. We may be more ready to listen now... less certain of our own answers. So, when Job asks, "Why?" — we, too, strain to hear the answers. And if answers are not forthcoming, then we, like Job, at least need to know how to live without them. "

The Book of Job is an extremely powerful study in uncertain times. So, beginning Sunday, September 18, 2005, at 6:00 p.m. in the Adult

Assembly room, you are invited to be a part of this intentional, seven-week Bible study. Led by Dr. Robert Dibble, participants will be part of a community where serious intent, personal preparation, and active involvement provide the basis for significant learning. Formations Sunday School literature continues a four-week unit of study entitled *Repairing Relationships*. No matter how delicately we live, our relationships need constant attention. We are born into a maze of human relationships, and never do we live in absolute independence. But there's a deeper truth at work in maintaining healthy relationships because of our relationship with God. Psychologist Carl Jung believed, "Bidden or not, God is present." We are created as relational creatures because we bear the image of a God who seeks and sustains relationships. In that sense, our relationships are the proof that we are all God's children! UPDATE ON OFFERINGS

As of July 31, 2005

Again this year, the Board of Administration wants to keep the congregation informed on the progress of offerings toward our budget. Fortunately, many of our members pay their pledges in advance. Our hope is that others will either contribute in advance or make their pledge payments equally throughout the year. This would prevent the cash shortage we have often experienced in late summer. In the figures below, the pro-rata portion for seven months of pledges paid in advance is shown as received in order to accurately reflect current income. On this basis, at the end of July we had received 87.3% of our budgeted offerings. This is significantly better than we have done in recent years. If we can continue this trend, we should not experience a cash flow problem later in the year. If you haven't made a contribution toward your 2005 pledge, please help us by doing so at your earliest opportunity.

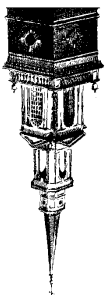
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
